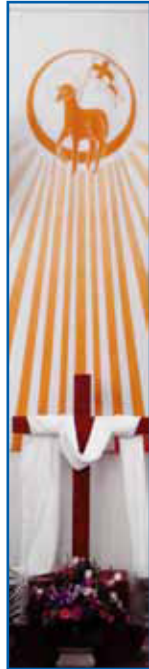

Our Visiting Seminarians

More and more, seminaries are turning to programs of pastoral formation --practical, hands-on lessons in which priests-in-training face some of the concerns they'll meet every day later in life. It's that kind of program--conducted by Immaculate Conception Seminary at Seton Hall in South Orange--in which St. Joseph's Home is cooperating, to the benefit of seminarians and Residents alike. One afternoon a week, the Home is host to a group of five seminarians who use the time to interact with Residents, learning about the aging and their concerns as well as issues of illness. "It's a wonderful way for the seminarians to acquire experience in an important phase of their ministry, meeting the elderly," said Sr. Rose, who coordinates the visits.

The seminarians spend about three hours at the Home each time they come, mostly making personal visits to the Residents' rooms or assisting with parties or other group functions. There's a spiritual aspect to the program as well, based on the seasons of the liturgical year. The seminarians might offer reflections for Advent, for example, or lead the Stations of the Cross during Lent. On other occasions they'll lead the recitation of the Rosary. "Our Residents pray for vocations, of course, and that's a source of great encouragement for the seminarians," said Sr. Rose. "In turn the seminarians develop a close relationship with the Residents, and an understanding of the elderly and infirm. In welcoming the Seton Hall seminarians to our Home, we all become an important part of their priestly training."

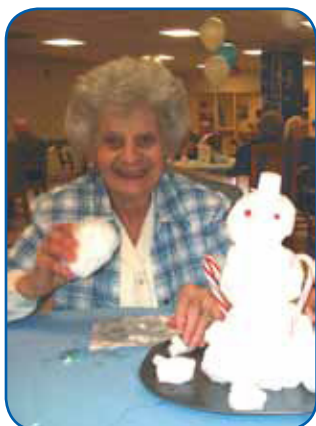


Novitiate Visit

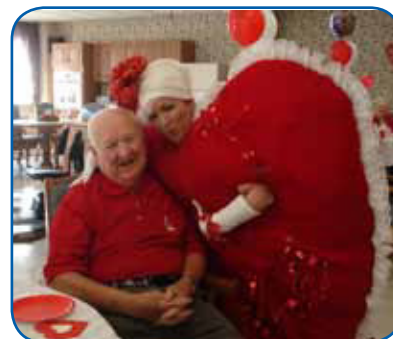

Help Needed with Major Projects



Our Home has passed the 30-year mark! We have been significantly impacted by state regulations and required technological advances that were simply not in existence when we first opened our doors in 1976!

We completed the mandatory installation of fire sprinklers and lighting in the chapel. Weather damage and age required us to replace the ceiling tiles in the auditorium.

Only with YOUR SUPPORT have we been able to complete these projects!

There is still much more we need to accomplish:

- **Replace the BOILER.** Originally purchased in 1975. It failed during the harsh winter months. The unit is no longer sold, and replacement parts are not readily available.
- **Replace our WALK-IN FREEZER.** Originally purchased in 1982. To keep food costs at a bare minimum, Sisters beg for large quantities of food. When we do have to purchase food, we buy large quantities to keep unit costs low. This is essential to daily operations.
- **Replace several AIR-CONDITIONING UNITS.**
- **Replace two sections of the ROOF.**
- **Address ongoing MAINTENANCE NEEDS AND REPAIRS in the building.**
